General Information

Applicant: Danny Duffey.
Status of Applicant: Agent for D&G Land Company LLC, Property Owner.
Requested Action: Rezoning from A, Agricultural to R-1 Single Family Residential.
Purpose: To allow the development of a Residential Subdivision and/or any Use Permitted in an R-1, Single Family Residential zoned district.
Existing Zoning: A, Agricultural.
Location: 5th Civil District; Parcel 19.02, Franklin County, TN Property Map No. 85, located on Owl Hollow Road.
Size: Approximately 8.04 +/- acres .
Existing Land Use: Open and Agricultural.
Surrounding Land Use and Zoning:
North – Residential, Agricultural, and A, Agricultural.
South – Residential, Agricultural, and A, Agricultural.
East – Agricultural, Residential, and A, Agricultural.
West – Agricultural, Residential, and A, Agricultural.

Applicable Regulations: Franklin County Zoning Resolution - Article X, Section 3 (Page 80); Article VI, Section 1 (Page 36); and Article XV (Page 117).

Specific Information

Previous Actions: The parcel was zoned A, Agricultural with the Adoption of Zoning in 1974. A Minor Division of property was approved on September 10, 2019 creating a 1.25 +/- acre parcel with remaining acreage. The subject parcel is the remaining acreage.
Access: The subject parcel fronts Owl Hollow Road for approximately 894' Owl Hollow Road is a county road with a 50' R-O-W and asphalt surface.
Utilities: A two and one half (2 1/2) inch water line runs along the north side of Owl Hollow Road. Potable water is provided by Belvidere Utilities. Power is provided by the Duck River Electric Membership Corporation. Sanitary waste disposal is assumed to be by individual septic tank systems.

Drainage/Flood: Drainage is mostly generalized to the south. There is a low lying area on the northwest portion of Lot #7; the north portion of Lot #6 slopes westerly towards Lot #7; Lot #1 slopes to the east. The site is not in an identified FEMA flood hazard area per Map No. 47051C0140E and 47051C0145E (not printed).

Area Characteristics: The immediate and general areas are characterized by agricultural activities with residential activities scattered along the roadways.

Fire Protection: Fire protection service is provided by the Belvidere Rural Volunteer Fire Department. There is a fire hydrant located approximately 3562' to the south of the subject property on Owl Hollow Road.

Other Public Services: Police protection is provided by the Franklin County Sheriff's Department.

Planning Jurisdiction: The site is located within the Franklin County Regional Planning Commission's jurisdiction.

Other: The property owner is requesting a rezoning of the property because he is proposing the development of a seven (7) lot residential subdivision. The Agricultural zoned district does not allow for the development of a residential subdivision with more than six (6) lots.

Analysis

Staff recommends the rezoning of the subject parcel from A, Agricultural to R-1, Single Family Residential as requested.

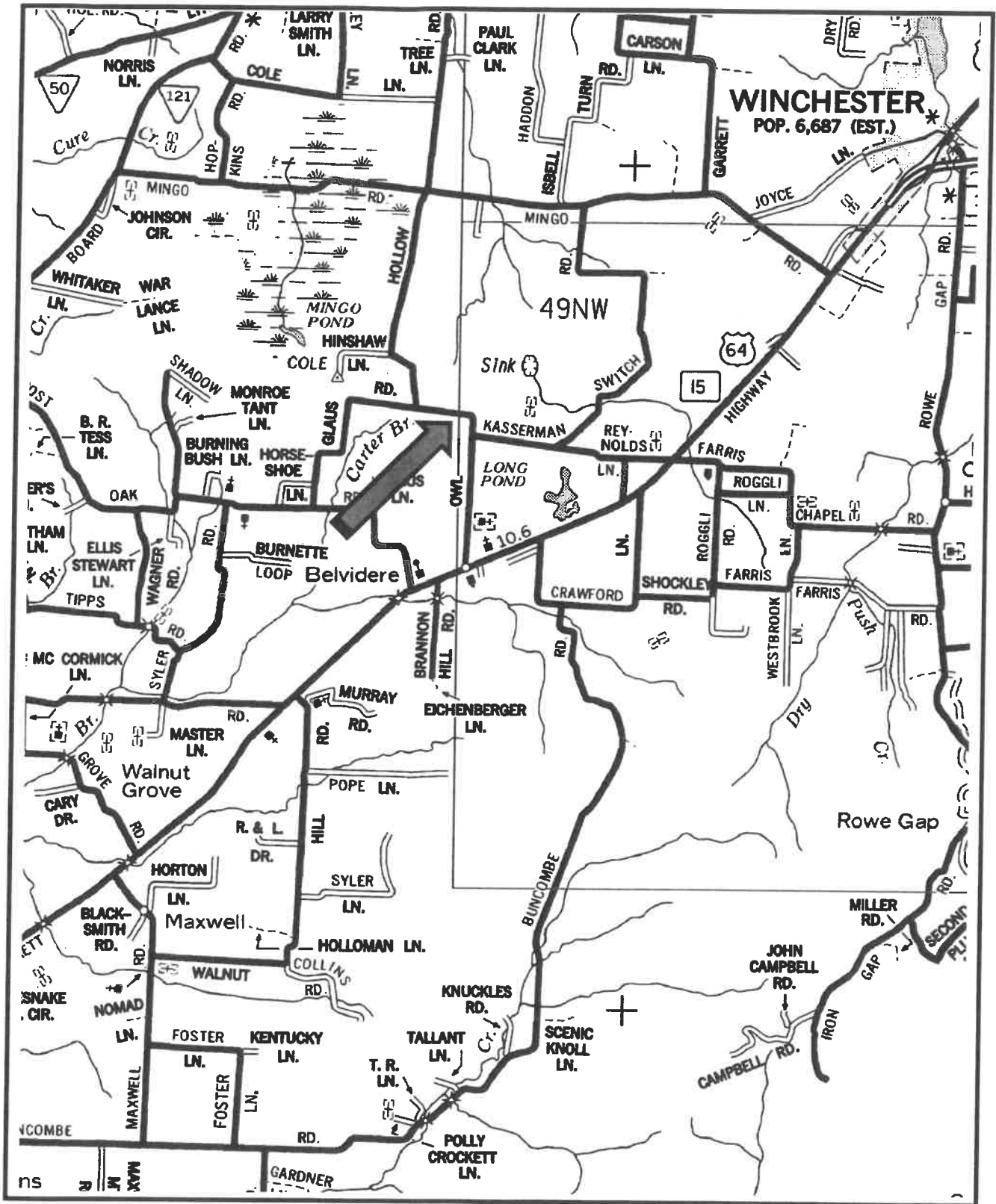

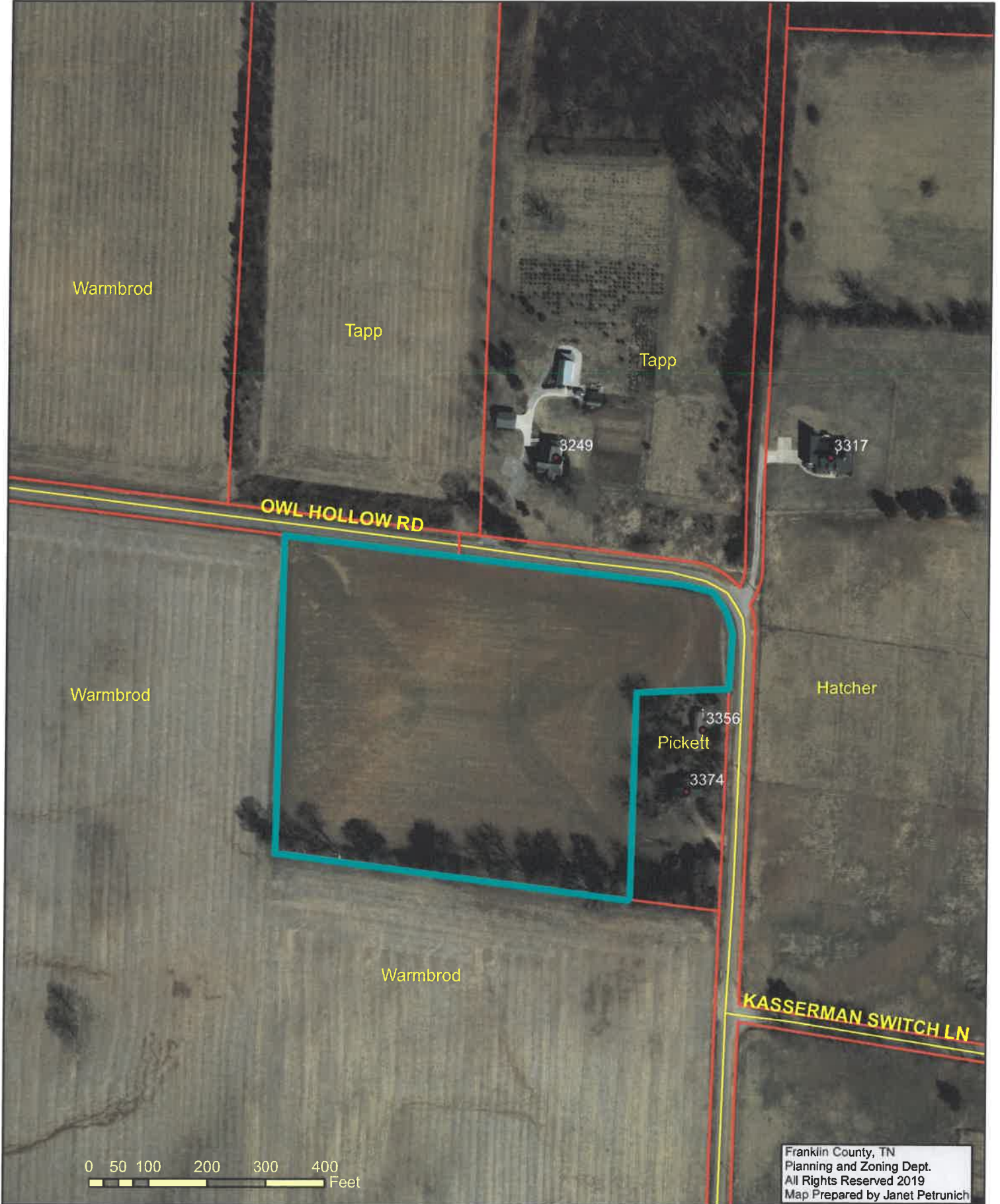


GIS View - Danny Duffy for D&G Land Company LLC

The Franklin County Regional Planning Commission – October 29, 2019.

The Franklin County Regional Planning Commission met in a regular session on October 29, 2019 at 6:00 PM in the Franklin County Courthouse.

The members present were Chairman Dave Van Buskirk, Secretary A.L. Shasteen, Vice Secretary David James, Steve Dixon, Jeremy Price and Greg Houston. Also present was Planning and Zoning Director/Building Commissioner Janet Petrunich. A Visitors' List is attached.

Dave Van Buskirk addressed the audience, describing the procedures and protocol of the meeting.

The minutes for the September 24, 2019 meeting were approved as written on a motion by Steve Dixon, seconded by David James. All aye.

Dave Van Buskirk asked for a motion to hear Case No. 12-19 for a Preliminary/Final Subdivision Plat Review before hearing Case No. 11-19 for a Rezoning of the same property, due to some challenging safety concerns that could possibly change the configuration of the plat and the need for a rezoning. A motion was made by David James to change the order of the Agenda, seconded by Jeremy Price.

Janet Petrunich introduced Case No. 12-19; Preliminary/Final Subdivision Plat Review; Applicant: Danny Duffey Agent for D&G Land Company LLC. Location – 5th Civil District; Parcel 19.02, Franklin County, TN Property Map No. 85, located on Owl Hollow Road, and read the Staff Report. Dave Van Buskirk asked Petrunich to read a letter that was received by the Planning and Zoning Department, addressing the Planning Commission, from John Woodall, Highway Superintendent. Petrunich read the letter. Petrunich also read the returned adjoining property owner notices. Van Buskirk polled the members for questions and comments. A.L. Shasteen suggested that the speed limit of 40 miles per hour on Owl Hollow Road be looked at and that the Board table the case until John Woodall was present to address the possibility of reducing the speed on Owl Hollow Road. David James questioned the possibility of the property owner reconfiguring some of the lots. Kurt Johnson, surveyor of record, stated that Woodall met with the owner of the property and suggested combining lots 1 and 2 together. Petrunich read the letter submitted by Woodall that stated that the combining of the two lots would be better than what was currently submitted but that it would still not meet the site distance requirements for driveway safety. Jeremy Price questioned Kurt Johnson, Surveyor for the applicant, in regards to the point of tangency and site distance. Kurt Johnson offered that they probably needed to take some measurements and check on TDOT site distance requirements. Petrunich suggested that contours be shown on the

plat due to the highest point of the property being in the curve of the road limiting site distance around the curve. Johnson requested time to step in the hallway to have a discussion with the applicant. Van Buskirk allowed a short recess. Van Buskirk called time on the recess and opened the meeting to comments from the audience. David Tapp, adjoining property owner, expressed his safety concerns and suggested that the developer build a single access road for the seven lots with only one access point onto Owl Hollow Road. Tapp questioned about restrictions as to the size of the homes that would be built; if the potential new buyers of the lots would be made aware of the dust, pesticides and heavy equipment use in the area due to agricultural practices of the surrounding properties; if the 2½ inch water line would be adequate enough for the additional houses that would be built. Cindy Hatcher, adjoining property owner, commented on the curve on Owl Hollow Road and that many people have missed the curve went through the fence and ended up in the field that she owns. Hatcher suggested installing speed bump strips to the road to slow people down. Johnson offered that there was a four inch water line coming up to the subject property. Johnson offered that he spoke with the property owner in the hallway and that they have agreed to table the subdivision plat until John Woodall was at the meeting. David James made a motion to table the Preliminary/Final Subdivision Plat for Owl Hollow Subdivision based upon the Staff Report and discussions. Greg Houston seconded the motion, all aye.

Janet Petrunich stated that if a new plat was to be presented at the next meeting that it would need to be submitted to the Planning and Zoning Office before the November deadline in order to run a new checklist on the proposal. Kurt Johnson asked if they could receive the comments before the meeting. Petrunich offered that it was a Staff Report, and once the Staff Report had been prepared for the Planning Commission members it was available in the case file for the public to review in the Planning and Zoning Department.

Dave Van Buskirk offered a postponement of Case No.11-19 for the rezoning of the same property that was heard in Case No. 12-19 until such case was heard next month. Petrunich asked the applicant if they wanted to postpone the rezoning or have the case heard due to the deadline of the Franklin County Board of Commissioners December meeting being before the next Planning Commission meeting. Danny Duffey, applicant, requested that the rezoning be heard.

Janet Petrunich introduced Case No. 11-19; Rezoning; Applicant: Danny Duffey, Agent for D&G Land Company LLC. Location – 5th Civil District; Parcel 19.02, Franklin County, TN Property Map No. 85, located on Owl Hollow Road and read the Staff Report and the returned adjoining property owner notices. A.L. Shasteen made a motion to recommend for the rezoning from A, Agricultural to R-1, Single Family

Residential. David James seconded the motion. Van Buskirk asked if anyone in the audience had any questions or comments. Dale Hatcher, in the audience, questioned the need for a fire hydrant in the area due to the proposed subdivision and future homes. Van Buskirk offered that the existing waterline would not support a fire hydrant, and that the Belvidere Fire Department had tankers. Van Buskirk brought the meeting back to the board. Van Buskirk reiterated the previous motion and second. All ayes.

Janet Petrunich offered, under Proposed Amendments to the Franklin County Zoning Resolution on the Agenda, in regards to the exemptions from the Fee Schedule currently allowed by the Franklin County Zoning Resolution for Educational, Governmental, and Religious facilities, along with Public Utilities that were discussed at the September 24, 2019 meeting, that if the exemptions were removed from the Zoning Resolution there would need to be, not only an amendment to the Zoning Resolution, but an amendment to the Fee Schedule for the new proposed fees to be created for Building Permits for the current exempt uses. Staff suggested, due to the office load in the Planning and Zoning Department and the Holiday schedules, those amendments be addressed after the beginning of the new year.

Janet Petrunich offered, under Proposed Amendments to the Franklin County Subdivision Regulations on the Agenda, the following items:

Amendment #1

Article II, Section D. Minor Division of Property Procedure, 2(r.)

Change from:

- r. Certificate of ownership and dedication, signed by the property owner(s).

To:

- r. Certificate of ownership, signed by the property owner(s).

Petrunich offered the wording be changed as there were no dedications to open spaces, parks or road ways. Kurt Johnson, Surveyor, stated that he did not see a need for the certificate of ownership on Minor Division survey plats. Johnson offered that the deeds showed ownership and would have to be signed and that having to get ownership signatures on the survey plat was extra and unneeded. Johnson requested that the certificate of ownership be omitted. Petrunich offered that through contact with other surveyors, they were surprised that Franklin County had not been requiring the owner's signature on the plats. Dave Van Buskirk called for a motion to change the Certificate of Ownership and Dedication on all Minor Division survey plats to a Certificate of Ownership. David James made a motion for the certificate to be changed. Jeremy Price seconded the motion, all aye.

Amendment #2

Article II, Section D. Minor Division of Property Procedure, 2(v.)

Change from:

- v. If there are any access easements, utilized for access to a lot within the subdivision shown on the plat, a Certificate of Private Driveway Notation signed by all dominant tenants (of the easement) shall be shown on the plat. Three (3) is the upper limit of access easements.

To:

- v. On Plats with an ingress/egress easement, utilized for access to a lot within the subdivision, reference all property owners (Name/DB/Page) that are dominant tenants of the easement.

There was a discussion regarding the current requirement of a private driveway certificate on plats with easements; the problems being created for the owner of the easement with the current wording on the certificate; and the requirement of signatures of all tenants of the easement. Petrunich suggested the requirement of the private driveway certificate be removed from the regulations. There was a lengthy discussion about dominant tenant and servient tenant. Johnson questioned as to who needed to sign the certificate. Petrunich stated that no signatures would be required if the private driveway certificate were removed from the regulations, instead the dominant tenants of the easement would be listed by name, deed book and page on the survey. Dave Van Buskirk called for a motion. Jeremy Price made the motion to add the new wording as proposed. A.L. Shasteen seconded the motion, all aye.

Amendment #3

Article II, Section D. Minor Division of Property Procedure, 2

Add:

- x. A note shall be added to all Minor Divisions with ingress/egress easements, utilized for access to a lot within the subdivision, stating: The ingress/egress easement(s) driveway shown hereon is a private driveway and is not intended to become a Franklin County road and therefore shall not be maintained by the Franklin County Highway Department.

David James made a motion for the note to be added to all Minor Division survey plats going forward. Jeremy Price seconded the motion, all aye.

Amendment #4

Article IV, Section C. Certificates

Remove the Certificate of Private Driveway Notation.

David James made a motion to remove the Certificate of Private Driveway Notation.
Steve Dixon seconded the motion, all aye.

Amendment #5

Article IV, Section C. Certificates

COMMERCIAL LEASE AGREEMENT

THIS COMMERCIAL LEASE AGREEMENT, made and entered into this ____ day of _____, 2019, by and between **FRANKLIN COUNTY, TENNESSEE**, hereinafter referred to as Lessor, **FRANKLIN COUNTY FARMERS MARKET ASSOCIATION**, hereinafter referred to collectively as Lessee, said Commercial Lease Agreement (hereinafter referred to as "Lease Agreement"), being as follows:

W I T N E S S E T H

That for and in consideration of the mutual agreements and covenants hereinafter expressed, Lessor and Lessee agree and covenant with the other as follows:

1. Lessor, for the consideration, and upon the conditions, and for the term, hereinafter expressed, do hereby lease and rent to Lessee the property known as the Franklin County Farmers Market Pavilion located on the Old Franklin County High School property adjoining Dinah Shore Boulevard in Winchester, Tennessee, for the purpose of maintaining a "Farmers Market" as provided in this Agreement.

2. The term of this lease shall be for a period of one (1) year, beginning on January 1, 2020 and ending on December 31, 2021. Any additional extensions or renewals of this lease agreement shall be subject to negotiations of the parties hereto. It is agreed that thirty (30) days prior to the end of any lease term, arrangements to extend said lease or agreements to extend said lease must be addressed and resolved by the parties. If no additional agreement is reached between Lessor and Lessee within thirty (30) days of the end of any lease term, then the Lease Agreement shall be

automatically extended for an additional one (1) year term unless terminated by Lessor.

3. Lessee agrees to pay to Lessor at the beginning of each new lease term the sum of One Thousand and no/100's Dollars (\$1,000.00) per year. A late fee of ten percent (10%) will be assessed as to any unpaid annual rental if said rental payment is not received within ten (10) days of beginning of the lease term.

4. Lessor covenants and warrants that Lessor has good title to the within described premises and a good and lawful right to enter into this lease; that Lessee may use said premises as a "Farmers Market" for the use and benefit of the citizens of Franklin County, Tennessee, as provided herein; that Lessor will warrant and defend the title to said premises against all claims whatsoever; and that Lessor will secure to Lessee uninterrupted peaceable possession of the premises and the right to use the same for the purpose above mentioned during the full term of this lease, or any renewal or extension thereof. Lessor shall have the right to enter and inspect the leased premises at any time during the lease term for any purpose and emergency purposes.

5. Maintenance of the premises, clean up and trash removal shall be the responsibility of the Lessee. Lessee is not permitted to make any structural changes, decorative changes, nor are they allowed to paint the leased premises or make any alterations to the premises without the prior written consent of the Lessor. Any signage placement must be approved by the Lessor.

6. Said property is being leased by Lessee from Lessor for the purpose of maintaining a "Farmers Market" for the use and benefit of the citizens of Franklin County, Tennessee. Lessee shall use the premises for this

purpose and no other during the following hours: Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays from 6:00 A.M. until 2:00 PM. All other uses of the premises by Lessee shall only be by permission granted by the Manager of the Franklin County Solid Waste Department and at such Manager's discretion. Any and all other use of the premises shall be as authorized and under the control of the Franklin County Pavilion Committee or Board. Lessee shall formulate and enforce Rules & Regulations for the use of said premises by vendors, farmers and other persons using the premises as set forth on this Agreement.

7. There shall be no discrimination in the use of said property and no favoritism shown to any person whatsoever based upon race, gender, religion or sexual orientation. No favoritism shall be shown in the use of said property toward any persons whatsoever and the use of the property shall be regulated strictly the Rules & Regulations adopted by Lessee.

8. Lessee agrees to hold Lessor harmless as a result of any injury, accident or incident which may occur on or about the leased premises. Lessee hereby agrees and covenants with Lessor that Lessee will procure and keep in full force and effect at its expense during the term of this lease and during any extension or renewal thereof a policy or policies of general liability insurance, insuring Lessor and Lessee, against loss or liability for bodily injuries, wrongful death, and property damage, to the extent of \$2,000,000.00, for a single occurrence, arising out of the use of said leased premises including the parking area in front and behind said premises during the term of this lease and any extension or renewal thereof. Lessee further agrees to hold Lessor harmless against liability for damages, accidents, and injuries to person or property not covered by said liability insurance. Prior to conducting business

at the leased premises, the Lessee agrees to furnish to Lessor satisfactory evidence of the liability coverage required by this paragraph, naming Lessor as an additional insured. All persons using this facility as a Farmers Market shall be responsible for payment of their own renter's insurance, including personal property or contents, if they choose to purchase same.

9. Lessor may terminate this Lease Agreement at any time, without notice, in the event that the Lessee should violate any terms of this agreement.

10. This Lease Agreement constitutes the whole agreement between the parties hereto, and no terms, agreements, promises, covenants, or representations, whether made before or after the date of this agreement, shall be deemed to be any part hereof unless set forth herein, or set forth in a supplemental agreement which shall also be in writing, duly executed and acknowledged by the parties.

11. This Lease Agreement shall be binding upon and shall inure to the benefit of the parties hereto, their respective heirs, assigns, representatives and successors in interest.

12. If either party under this lease has to initiate a Court action to enforce any term of this Lease Agreement and said party is successful in enforcing the same then the successful party shall be entitled to the payment of its attorney's fees and court costs by the unsuccessful party for the enforcement action.

13. Prior to execution, this Lease Agreement must be approved in final form by the Franklin County Commission.

14. This Lease Agreement has been executed in duplicate by the parties hereto, Lessor and Lessee receiving an executed copy hereof.

REQUIREMENTS SUPPLIED. Customer orders from UniFirst Corp. ("UniFirst") the rental garments and/or other items of the type specified in this Agreement ("Merchandise") and related pickup/delivery and maintenance services (collectively with Merchandise, "Services") for all of Customer's requirements therefor, at the prices and upon the terms and conditions set forth herein. Additional Services requested by Customer, verbally or in writing, will also be covered by this Agreement. All rental Merchandise supplied to Customer remains the property of UniFirst. Customer warrants that it is not subject to, and that this Agreement does not interfere or conflict with, any existing agreement for the supply of the Merchandise or Services covered.

PERFORMANCE GUARANTEE. UNIFIRST GUARANTEES TO DELIVER HIGH-QUALITY SERVICE AT ALL TIMES. All items of Merchandise cleaned, finished, inspected, repaired and delivered by UniFirst will meet or exceed industry standards, or non-conforming items will be replaced by the next scheduled delivery day at no cost to Customer. Items of rental Merchandise requiring replacement due to normal wear and tear will be replaced at no cost to Customer, save for any applicable personalization and setup charges.

Customer expressly waives the right to terminate this Agreement during the initial term or any extension thereof for deficiencies in the quality of Services unless: (1) complaints are first made in writing to UniFirst which set forth the precise nature of any deficiencies; (2) UniFirst is afforded at least 60 days to correct any deficiencies complained of; and (3) UniFirst fails to correct those deficiencies complained of within 60 days. In the event Customer complies with the foregoing and UniFirst fails to correct such deficiencies, Customer may terminate this Agreement by written notice to UniFirst, providing that all previous balances due to UniFirst have been paid in full and that all other conditions to terminate have been satisfied. Any delay or interruption of the Services provided for in this Agreement by reason of acts of God, fires, explosions, strikes or other industrial disturbances, or any other cause not within the control of UniFirst, shall not be deemed a breach or violation of this Agreement.

TERM AND RENEWAL. This Agreement is effective when signed by both the Customer and UniFirst Location Manager and continues in effect for 60 months after installation of Merchandise (for new customers) or any renewal date. This Agreement will be renewed automatically and continuously for multiple successive 60-month periods unless Customer or UniFirst gives written notice of non-renewal to the other at least 90 days prior to the next expiration date.

PRICES AND PAYMENTS. Prices are based on 52 weeks of service per year. Any increase(s) in Service Frequency could result in additional charges. On an annual basis, the prices then in effect will be increased by the greater of the annual percent increase in the Consumer Price Index - All Urban Consumers, Series ID: CUUROOOSAG, other goods and services, or by 5%. Additional price increases and other charges may be imposed by separate written notice or by notation on Customer's Invoice. Customer may, however, decline such additional increases or charges by notifying UniFirst in writing within 10 days after receipt of such notice or notation. If Customer declines said additional price increases, UniFirst may terminate this Agreement. Customer also agrees to pay the other charges and minimum weekly charge herein specified. Charges relating to a wearer leaving Customer's employ can be terminated by (1) giving notice thereof to UniFirst and (2) returning or paying for any missing Merchandise issued to that individual. Any Merchandise payments required pursuant to this Agreement will be at the replacement price(s) then in effect hereunder. If an authorized Customer representative is not available to receive and acknowledge delivery of Merchandise, Customer authorizes UniFirst to make delivery and assumes responsibility for related charges/invoices.

If Customer fails to make timely payment, UniFirst may, at any time and in its sole discretion, terminate this Agreement by giving written notice to Customer, whether or not UniFirst has previously strictly enforced Customer's obligation to make timely payments. Customer agrees to pay, and will pay, all applicable sales, use, personal property and other taxes and assessments arising out of this Agreement.

DEFE CHARGE. Customer's invoices may also include a DEFE charge to cover all or portions of certain expenses including:

D = DELIVERY, or expenses associated with the actual delivery of Services and Merchandise to Customer's place of business, primarily Route Sales Representative commissions, management salaries, vehicle depreciation, equipment maintenance, insurance, road use charges and local access fees.

E = ENVIRONMENTAL, or expenses (past, present and future) UniFirst absorbs related to wastewater testing, purification, effluent control, solids disposal, supplies and equipment for pollution controls and energy conservation and overall regulatory compliance.

F = FUEL, or the gas, diesel fuel, oil and lubricant expenses associated with keeping UniFirst's fleet vehicles on the road and servicing its customers.

E = ENERGY, primarily the natural gas UniFirst uses to run boilers and gas dryers, plus other local utility charges.

MERCHANDISE. Customer acknowledges and agrees to notify all employees that Merchandise supplied is for general occupational use and, except as expressly specified below, affords no special user protections. Customer further acknowledges that: (1) Customer has unilaterally and independently determined and selected the nature, style, performance characteristics, number of changes and scope of all Merchandise to be used and the appropriateness of such Merchandise for Customer's specific needs or intended uses; (2) UniFirst does not have any obligation to advise, and has not advised, Customer concerning the fitness or suitability of the Merchandise for Customer's intended use; (3) UniFirst makes no representation, warranty or covenant regarding the performance of the Merchandise (including without limitation Flame Resistant and Visibility Merchandise); and (4) UniFirst shall in no way be responsible or liable for any injury or harm suffered by any Customer employees while wearing or using any Merchandise. Customer agrees to indemnify and hold harmless UniFirst and its employees and agents from and against all claims, injuries or damages to any person or property resulting from Customer's or Customer's employee use of the Merchandise, whether or not such claims, injuries or damages arise from any alleged defects in the Merchandise.

Flame Resistant ("FR") Merchandise supplied hereunder is intended only to prevent the ignition and burning of fabric away from the point of high heat impingement and to be self-extinguishing upon removal of the ignition source. FR items will not provide significant protection from burns in the immediate area of high heat contact due to thermal transfer through the fabric and/or destruction of the fabric in the area of such exposure. FR items are designed for continuous wear as only a secondary level of protection. Primary protection is still required for work activities where direct or significant exposure to heat or open flame is likely to occur.

Visibility Merchandise is intended to provide improved conspicuity of the wearer under daylight conditions and when illuminated by a light source of sufficient candlepower at night. It is Customer's responsibility to determine the level of conspicuity needed by wearers under specific work conditions. Further, Customer agrees that Visibility Merchandise alone does not ensure conspicuity of the wearer and that additional safety precautions may be necessary. The Visibility Merchandise supplied satisfied particular ANSI/ISEA standards only when they were new and unused and only if so labeled. Customer acknowledges that usage and laundering of Visibility Merchandise may adversely affect its conspicuity.

Healthcare/Food-Related Customer acknowledges that: (1) UniFirst does not guarantee or warrant that the Merchandise selected by Customer or that processed garments delivered by UniFirst will be appropriate or sufficient to provide a hygienic level adequate for individual Customer's needs; and (2) optional poly-bagging is recommended to reduce the risk of cross-contamination of Merchandise, and the failure to utilize such service may adversely affect the efficacy of UniFirst's hygienic cleaning process. (* Poly-bag services incur additional charges.)

If any Merchandise supplied hereunder is Merchandise that: (1) UniFirst does not stock for whatever reason (including due to style, color, size or brand); (2) consists of non-UniFirst manufactured or customized FR Merchandise; or (3) consists of Merchandise that has been permanently personalized (in all cases known as "Non-Standard Merchandise"), then, upon the discontinuance of any Service hereunder at any time for any reason, including expiration, termination, or cancellation of this Agreement, with or without cause, discontinuation of UniFirst Merchandise from Customer's Service Program, or due to employee reductions (in each case a "Discontinuance of Service"), Customer will purchase at the time of such Discontinuance of Service all affected Non-Standard Merchandise items then in UniFirst's inventory (in-service, shelf, as well as any manufacturer's supplies ordered for Customer's use), paying for same the replacement charges then in effect.

Customer agrees not to contaminate any Merchandise with asbestos, heavy metals, solvents, inks or other hazardous or toxic substances ("contaminants"). Customer agrees to pay UniFirst for all Merchandise that is lost, stolen, damaged or abused beyond repair. As a condition to the termination of this Agreement, for whatever reason, Customer will return to UniFirst all standard Merchandise in good and usable condition or pay for same at the replacement charges then in effect.

OBLIGATIONS AND REMEDIES. If Customer breaches or terminates this Agreement before the expiration date for any reason (other than for UniFirst's failure under the performance guarantee described above), Customer will pay UniFirst, as liquidated damages and not as a penalty (the parties acknowledging that actual damages would be difficult to calculate with reasonable certainty) an amount equal to 80 percent of the average weekly amounts invoiced in the preceding 26 weeks, multiplied by the number of weeks remaining in the current term. These damages will be in addition to all other obligations or amounts owed by Customer to UniFirst, including the return of Standard Merchandise or payment of replacement charges, and the purchase of any Non-Standard Merchandise items as set forth herein.

This Agreement shall be governed by Massachusetts law (exclusive of choice of law). If a dispute arises from or relates in any way to this Agreement or any alleged breach thereof at any time, the parties will first attempt to resolve the claim or dispute by negotiation at agreed time(s) and location(s). All negotiations are confidential and will be treated as settlement negotiations. Any matter not resolved through direct negotiations within 30 days shall be resolved exclusively by final and binding arbitration, conducted in the capital city of the state where Customer has its principal place of business (or some other location mutually agreed); pursuant to the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association; and, governed by the Federal Arbitration Act, to the exclusion of state law inconsistent therewith. The parties will agree upon one (1) Arbitrator to settle the controversy or claim. The successful or substantially prevailing party in any proceeding, including any appeals thereof (as determined by the Arbitrator/court) shall recover all of its costs and expenses including, without limitation, reasonable attorney fees, witness fees and discovery costs, all of which shall be included in and as a part of the judgment or award rendered hereunder. This provision for Arbitration is specifically enforceable by the parties; the Arbitrator shall have no power to vary or ignore the provisions hereof; and, the decision of the Arbitrator in accordance herewith, may be entered in any court having jurisdiction thereof. Customer acknowledges that, with respect to all such disputes, it has voluntarily and knowingly waived any right it may have to a jury trial or to participate in a class action or class litigation as a representative of any other persons or as a member of any class of persons, or to consolidate its claims with those of any other persons or class of persons. If this prohibition against class litigation is ruled to be unenforceable for any reason in any proceeding, then the prohibition against class litigation shall be void and of no force and effect in that proceeding.

MISCELLANEOUS. The parties agree that this Agreement represents the entire agreement between them. In the event Customer issues a purchase order to UniFirst at any time, none of the standard pre-printed terms and conditions therein shall have any application to this Agreement, or any transactions occurring pursuant hereto or thereto. UniFirst may, in its sole discretion, assign this Agreement. Customer may not assign this Agreement without the prior written consent of UniFirst. Customer agrees that in the event it sells or transfers its business, it will require the purchaser or transferee to assume all obligations and responsibilities under this Agreement; provided that such assumption shall not relieve Customer of its liabilities hereunder; and provided further that any failure by a purchaser or transferee to assume this Agreement shall constitute a breach and early termination of this Agreement resulting in the obligation to pay all amounts on account thereof as set forth in this Agreement. Neither party will be liable for any incidental, consequential, special or punitive damages. In no event shall UniFirst's aggregate liability to Customer for any and all claims exceed the sum of all amounts actually paid by Customer to UniFirst. In the event any portion of this Agreement is held by a court of competent jurisdiction or by a duly appointed arbitrator to be unenforceable, the balance will remain in effect. All written notices provided to UniFirst must be sent by certified mail to the attention of the Location Manager. In Texas and certain other locations, UniFirst's business is conducted by, and the term "UniFirst" as used herein means, UniFirst Holdings, Inc. d.b.a. UniFirst.

The Resolution before you is not new, it was first brought to the County Commission in 2016, and it was soundly rejected, something like 13-3, or so. I do not know why it was rejected, was it for good reasons, was it personalities, or whatever. But that was then and this is now. I wanted to go thru the Budget process as it currently exists, before recommending any changes – and I now have and I think we can do better.

I am hoping that a new approach will make a positive difference.

I strongly believe that the County Legislative Body, who are directly elected by the people, are the only ones who should be in charge of the Budget and the Budget process. Currently, according to TCA, we have two members on the Finance Committee that are not directly elected by the people, and who are in effect voting to pass their own budget. I also believe that having one person from each County district gives the county taxpayers better and more fair representation in the creation of the Budget.

Just about everything we do in County Government requires money – if we have the money, we can do it, if we don't have the money, then we can't – it's really that simple. Whether we like it or not, it revolves around the money, therefore it revolves around the Budget, therefore the better and more intelligent Budget we can come up with, the more we can do for our people. The best time for detailed changes to a budget is not at the last minute when it comes before the Commission but much earlier when it is being put together in the months before. Also, a committee like this does not meet during the day when many commissioners have to work, but rather it meets at night when attendance is easier for the members.

An over \$100,000,000 budget, along with a 20.5 cent tax hike is no joke.

This Committee will have to have some special training from CTAS so that everyone becomes comfortable with the documents they are given, also, each department head will go over their department – the challenges they have – so that it is 'We' not 'Them vs Us' because both our goals should be to give our taxpayers the most bang for their buck and we can figure this out together.

We are one of the few counties with a population our size, with as diverse an economy as we have, and with a budget our size – that has not added a larger, more representative, more in-depth Budget Committee.

A vital part of the Resolution is the choice that you have with your other District commissioner to decide between yourselves which of you will be on this Committee, or will you rotate.

At the Tennessee General Assembly, the most powerful committee is the Budget Committee – there is no other way to say it, it just is what it is – it requires money to do things and these are the people who begin that process.

As the years go by, you and I realize that life does not get simpler, it gets more complicated – and governance is no different. We in the County Commission need to develop a 'bench' of experienced people who understand the finances of this county as we go forward into a more complicated and less financially forgiving future.

Please carefully consider this proposal and do not hesitate to call with questions or comments – good or bad.

The goal is to do better.

WHEREAS, no Special Budget Committee has been created by the Franklin County legislative body and therefore the County Financial Management Committee has assumed those duties since the Act was adopted, and

WHEREAS, the Franklin County Commission is now of the opinion that a Special Budget Committee should be created as authorized by the Act.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Board of County Commissioners of Franklin County, Tennessee, meeting in its regular session on this _____ day of _____, 2019 that a Special Budget Committee is hereby created as authorized by T.C.A. §5-21-105(a)(1) and that said Special Budget Committee shall assume all of the duties and responsibilities as set forth in T.C.A. §5-21-105(d) regarding the preparation of an annual budget for Franklin County, Tennessee; however, scope of responsibility of the Budget Committee is restricted to the preparation of the Franklin County Budget; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that said Special Budget Committee shall be comprised of the County Mayor who shall serve as Chairman of said committee, and one County Commissioners from each of the eight Franklin County Commission Districts. Commissioners representing the two seats in each District shall decide amongst themselves which Commissioners shall serve each term on the Special Budget Committee and the term shall be for a period of two (2) years; and

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that the term of office for the initial inception of the Budget Committee will be for however long until the next General Election of County Commissioners. The Commissioner with the most time in service shall serve this initial inception term, unless otherwise agreed upon between the two District Commissioners. Thereafter, the term of office shall be for two years. The Commissioners' terms will alternate between the A seat and B seat, unless otherwise agreed upon between the two District Commissioners. The Commissioner with the most time in service in each District shall serve the first two (2) year term, unless otherwise agreed upon between those two Commissioners.

This Resolution shall not affect any other portions of Resolution No. 0009-05 previously adopted and said Resolution shall remain in full force and effect in all other regards.

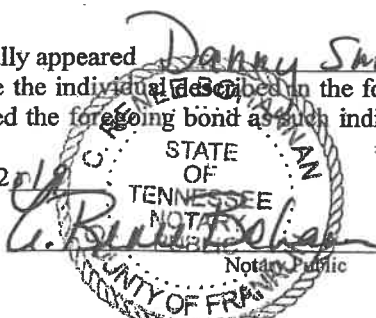

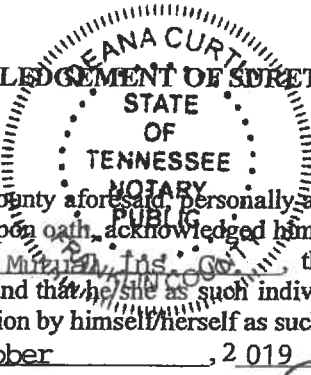

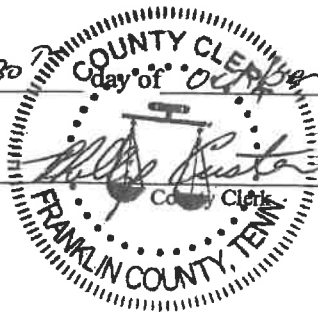
